ADOPTION OF THE 2022 MUNICIPAL BUDGET

Mayor Misciagna calls for a motion to adopt Resolution No. 022-160 - Adoption of the 2022 Municipal Budget

A motion was made by Council President Metzdorf and seconded by Councilmember Epstein to confirm.

Councilmember Fenwick: While I agree with most of the budget as drafted, I believe we should be using more surplus and COVID relief money to offset the tax increase. I disagree with the allocation of hundred of thousands of dollars of COVID relief money for the capital improvement fund, these projects should be bonded for given that interest rates are still relatively low. I think it is important to raise these issues and we consider them drafting the budget. Therefore, I vote no.

Councilmember Epstein: I want to thank you guys for putting together a fiscally responsible budget and addressing all the concerns that our citizens have brought to our attention. It will allow us to function as we all ways do as a town. It has a focus on public safety, it is ensuring that our financial standing and bonding will be maintained. We used surplus and we used COVID funding because we can use it for one time, and we did a great job putting that into the budget. Counter to what was set, depleting, and dipping into the surplus is probably the worse thing you can do on a continuous basis. I thank you for being responsible and not over dipping. We have a great budget, and I am an emphatic yes.

Council President Metzdorf: Will and I worked on the budget together and we were there for the process, we probably agreed on 99% of the budget. We did disagree on the amount of surplus to use. Currently this budget has a surplus of \$916,000. I want to save taxpayers money. When Mr. Fenwick brought that forth, using more surplus then suggested, we started investigating. He wanted to take an additional \$100,000 out of the surplus and that did sound attractive to me. Except, I went to the CFO and to the Auditor, and I was told that already \$916,000 in surplus is too low so to make it \$816,000 would be fiscally irresponsible. The Borough might not be able to financially survive that. I went to our CFO and asked if we took an additional \$100,000 of the surplus, what would that that save the average taxpayer a year? She said \$6.00. Do we want to risk our financial health of the Borough for \$6.00. I know that \$6,00 is still money and money is

best spent with the taxpayers, but to be fiscally irresponsible is not sound. The suggestion from Moody's, our CFO and Auditor is to always have \$1.5 million, and we are below that.

Another thing Mr. Fenwick and I disagreed on, is the hiring of an additional police officer. In this budget we will be expanding the Police Department by one officer. We did that because the Chief advised that one police officer who is making \$120,00 a year will be leaving the employment of Park Ridge he is going to another state. The replacement of his is necessary and an entry level police officer has a salary of about \$55,000. Hiring a new police officer is another \$55,000 if you add that up it is \$110,000 verse the \$120,000 salary of the officer leaving. When the Police Officer spoke to us about that, I wondered how we could save the taxpayer money. We were going to give the Chief \$125,000 in overtime, but he agreed to keep it at \$100,000, so we saved another \$25,000. The Chief presented a letter to me, which I gave to all the Councilmembers, and he explained why we need another officer. We do have a lot more residents in the James, one day Sony will be developed and there is an increase in crime. In comparison to Montvale, Woodcliff Lake and Rivervale his department is about the same size of Woodcliff Lake and yet we have 3,000 more residents. This would be budget neutral for at least this year. Most of us agree it is prudent to hire a new officer.

Councilmember Fenwick: I would like to correct one minor thing, I did not oppose the hiring of the additional police officer, I just disagreed on the timing of that hiring.

Council President Metzdorf: Yes, you wanted to wait a year or so.

Mayor Misciagna: It is a good budget and you guys worked hard putting it together. We take or direction from our professionals, we hire good professionals. I am an electrician; I shouldn't be making decisions on our municipal finances without having input from people like our Auditor Jeff Bliss. The thing with the surplus, and Jeff Bliss has educated me a lot about this over the last decade, it is important for a lot of reasons. Even though we are good, we are still short from where we should be in surplus. I support what you guys did and appreciate all of the hard work.

Everything the previous owner was required to do they will be required as well. **Mr. Hunt**: So, there would be no impact to the pilot program? John Schettino: The assume all the liabilities and the responsibilities and the representations that were made by the previous owner, all of there obligations under the developer's agreements are being assigned to the new owner.

Mr. Hunt: Anything happening with the electric pond, I know us residents sent letters of support for dredging it? **Mayor Misciagna**: Nothing to report on right now. We are very hopeful that we might be getting some federal funds for some of our projects, which I do not want to bring up at this point, but we are very hopeful. We have requested money from different avenues, from federal funding to state funding.

<u>Councilmember Fenwick</u>: Fish and Game will come down this summer and do an ecological study of the pond.

<u>Mr. Hunt</u>: COVID relief funds, you mentioned those must be spent, how does that work? <u>Mr. Schettino</u>: They came with some restrictions and the can be used only for onetime expenses, so you cannot use it for operating expenses unless it was relating to public health and safety. Prudent advice is to use it on an expense that you will only have one time, not to have a gap in your budget next year, so you would not use it on salaries. There were restrictions on the allowable expenditures the money can be used for. <u>Jeff Bliss</u>: You can use it for revenue loss, so the Borough used there's to offset the \$10million revenue loss because of COVID. The schools have there own programs, they have to use it for either learning loss of specific COVID expenditures.

<u>Mr. Hunt:</u> How much problems does the OPRA requests cause? <u>Ms. Giandomenico:</u> We have multiple requests daily, from developers, real estate agents, contractors, and lawyers, etc. who are looking for business. The intent is to provide public information, but some use it for their businesses to solicit clientele.

BOROUGH OF PARK RIDGE RESOLUTION NO. 022-170

SUPPORTING OPRA REFORM

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Open Public Records Act (OPRA), N.J.S.A. 47:1A-1 et seq., enacted in 2002, has been in effect long enough to review the impact on Municipalities; and

WHEREAS, it is the position of the Bergen County League of Municipalities (BCLOM), which represents all 70 municipalities in Bergen County, that OPRA can and must be improved upon to make it less onerous on municipalities and protect the safety and welfare of the public; and

WHEREAS, municipal staff and budgets are increasingly utilized to accommodate the requestors and commercial entities who bombard municipalities with public records requests to the extent that in some instances, additional personnel are hired primarily to handle such requests; and

WHEREAS, municipalities are already required by state law to post and provide certain information and documentation on their municipal websites, including but not limited to, annual budgets, annual financial statements, annual audits, public meeting notices and meeting minutes; and

WHEREAS, under existing law, OPRA fees are woefully inadequate for the amount of time and effort needed to search for documents; it takes valuable time away from staff — not only in the Clerk's office — but also among other departments that may be involved in the same request; and

WHEREAS, OPRA has become broadly construed in favor of access and the requestor and, a requestor who prevails in any proceeding in appealing a denial of access is permitted to

collect exorbitant attorney's fees; conversely, however, the resources and guidance available to record custodians and municipal counsel tasked with responding to such requests has narrowed drastically in the ever-changing OPRA arena, muddied by subsequent, voluminous and often-conflicting court decisions that contradict the original intent of the law and will continue to do so in the absence of necessary legislative reform; and

WHEREAS, OPRA law allows outside businesses, and activist groups to utilize municipal time and services for marketing leads or private commercial gain, and for litigants to use OPRA as a method of discovery; and

WHEREAS, a clear distinction needs to be made between individual and commercial and discovery requests; and

WHEREAS, serious concerns about breaches or misuse of personal information exist along with the potential for OPRA to be exploited and abused by requestors, as a threat, harassment, or retaliatory measure to bury local governments in hundreds of requests, not necessarily because the requested records are of any particular interest, but merely because they can and have been emboldened by the courts to do so, to the significant detriment of all other municipal business; and

WHEREAS, most importantly, OPRA must be reformed to enable municipalities, their respective record custodians and legal counsels to protect the safety and welfare of the general public;

WHEREAS, over the years, court decisions have chipped away at the reasonable expectation of privacy provision of the law, thus allowing the law to be molded and wielded as a tool that severs any sensible balance of transparency, and instead, now perpetuates rampant and dangerous degrees of for-profit data-mining, unsolicited marketing and uncontrolled publications of records on internet search engines specifically designed to circumvent and bypass what few protective measures currently exist under OPRA, and all while allowing the requestor to remain cloaked in anonymity, should they choose to exercise that option; and

WHEREAS, the pandemic has resulted in a startling and exponential rise in fraud and identity theft, crimes that were already notoriously difficult to investigate, track and prosecute; OPRA, left unchecked and unreformed, continues to add fuel to this already dangerous fire; and

WHEREAS, in a most reprehensible instance in the midst of the pandemic, the unthinkable happened when the young son of a U.S. District Court Judge was senselessly killed by an individual who had managed to compile a dossier of personal information about the Judge including a home address, ushering in the passage of Daniel's Law; and

WHEREAS, while this law as intentioned provides for necessary strides and long overdue amendments to OPRA, the scope of protection provided is critically deficient, the implementation creates challenges for custodians and municipal officials that remain unaddressed by law, with limited channels for guidance, while the vast remainder of the Open Public Records Act continues to be left recklessly unreformed, potentially leaving any officials not covered under Daniel's Law or even, the general public at-large exposed to the whim of any nefarious OPRA requestor lurking in the shadows of those demanding transparency at any cost;

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill No. 4894, introduced January 17, 2019, calling for the creation of a study commission to review OPRA, to-date, has been left negligently stagnant and, to-date the legislative approach to addressing the dangers of OPRA have been

fragmented, haphazard and contradictory at best, leading to a dire need for streamlined overhaul and reform, which, at a minimum should include the following:

- Immediate creation of a study commission on OPRA.
- Uniformity under the law: municipalities shall not be subject to any provision under OPRA that the legislature or other state agencies are, by contrast, exempt from.
- Provide a universal platform for clear and concise guidance for records custodians. Such guidance should be in place prior to any laws that impact OPRA going into effect.
- Require that official OPRA Request forms be used in order to be considered valid, including certifications by the requestor of (1) non-conviction of an indictable offense and (2) that information obtained will not be used for profit, solicitation, marketing or commercial gain, or published as part of a separate internet database or search engine.
- Prohibit OPRA requestors from remaining anonymous.
- Require that requestors provide a State of New Jersey address in order to be valid (OPRA should not apply to out-of-state requests).
- Prohibit requests for commercial purposes.
- Exempt email addresses (also serves as a deterrent to spoofing, phishing and other cyber scams and crimes).
- Exempt information maintained for emergency notification purposes.
- Exempt any information related to minor individuals, disabled persons and senior citizens as well as classes of citizens who are vulnerable to exploitation of their information.
- Exempt personal identifying information from Motor Vehicle Accident Reports, including driver's license numbers, dates of birth (DOBs), home addresses, VINs and registration/plate numbers, unless the requestor is a subject of the record, or their designated legal or insurance representative.
- Exempt pet license information to a need-to-know basis only (health department, police department, veterinarian of record, hospital, bite victim) to deter rising pet thefts and potential for targeted thefts of non-large-breed dog owners.
- Reaffirm exemption of unlisted telephone numbers, including personal cell phones.
- Exempt property owner names, CAMA Data and reaffirm the exemption of property record cards.
- Protections afforded under Daniel's Law should be afforded to all government officials, employees, volunteers and members of the general public as the threats from the disclosure of personal information is not unique to those rightfully protected under Daniel's Law.
- Provide a carve out for fee-shifting where a municipality in good faith and without clear

guidance through Statute or case law denies a request or redacts information which could reasonably be interpreted as not subject to disclosure.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the BCLOM finds it imperative that the New Jersey Senate and Assembly review and reform the New Jersey Open Public Records Act.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution are sent to all New Jersey State Legislators, the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, the New Jersey Municipal Clerks' Association, the Bergen County Municipal Clerks' Association, the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police and the Bergen County Police Chiefs' Association.



ALLOCATION OF APPROPRIATIONS










